
A History of the Political Career of the Former Councillor Anne Field



Summary

After conducting an interview with former Councillor Ann Field, I have come to realise the immense and diverse nature of her involvement in the local community. She first served as a Councillor at Rockdale City Council (1991-1999) and subsequently moved to Kogarah Council (1999-2008). Her positions as an Alderman and later as a Councillor on the Rockdale City Council, exemplify her extensive commitments in the community. She continues this involvement today through clubs including the Business and Professional Women's Club (BPW) – Sydney Club and the service organisation, Rotary International.

In 2000, her enormous contributions to her local area were recognised and she was presented with the Southern Sydney Regional Organisation of Council (SSROC) Award for her work in the heritage field. She was also awarded the Endna Ryan Award 2006, Government category (which recognises feminist activity in the government sphere).

I have enclosed a collection of newspaper articles from a variety of sources, which reflects Councillor Field's interests in areas such as child care, urban design, history & heritage, and access among other things. The timeline of Councillor Field's Council career has been included to highlight her extensive and diversified political involvement.

Included also are a number of Letters to the Editor written by Councillor Field and copies of her Local Government election brochures from 1991 and 1995, which complete the archival records of Councillor Field's terms on Council.

Councillor Field was very dedicated and committed, devoting much of her time on Council to address the concerns and feedback of residents. She was acknowledged by residents as being fair and always willing to support and assist those around her.

I have enclosed part of a thank-you note from a resident to the former Councillor Field.

"Anne, without you being there to help me, I don't know if I'd have gone this far. Your constant support and understanding, it was something that kept me going. I will never be able to find enough words to thank you. Too many doors kept shutting in front of me, your door was always open, and you always listened when I needed to talk to you. No matter how tired you were – you were always there."

When and why did you first run for Council?

Well, I ran for Rockdale City Council in September 1991.

I have long had an interest in politics and had been involved in community Committees for quite a while. In 1985, I joined Kogarah Council's International Youth Year Committee (by invitation) and then the Bicentennial Committee at Kogarah Council. By late 1985, I was appointed to the Board of St George Hospital and I later chaired a number of Committees.

In 1978, I joined the Australian Federation Business and Professional Women, of which I am still a member over 30 years later and, in 1988, I joined the Rockdale Community Mobile Nursing Service Board. I had developed the skills as well as the good community links and these allowed me to consider myself a suitable candidate.

In 1990, I addressed the Rotary Club of Rockdale and in late 1990, I joined the Rotary Club of Rockdale, nominated by John Robinson, who was a local car dealer. In mid-1991, I became the President of the Rotary Club of Rockdale, which made me the first female President of a Rotary Club in Sydney. So, it was a natural step to jump from all these community Committees to run for Council. And that opportunity came in September 1991.

Did you have any family history in politics?

Yes, in fact I did. My father's mother's father was a Councillor... well, they were called Aldermen in those days. He was on the Malmsbury Council in Victoria near Castlemaine and was an Alderman in the late 1880's. I guess my great grandfather, William Field, who is written up in the History of Maryborough in Victoria, was seen as being an outspoken man with a good sense of purpose- some of the numerous skills which I hope to have demonstrated throughout my political career.

More recently, I had a relative who sat, during the 1950's to 1970's, in the Victorian Legislative Assembly in an administrative capacity. He actually advised Victorian Premiers over a period of twenty years or so.

As a young child, I was always brought up to discuss world events and local events. So, I was always very aware of what was going on around me. These were really important skills to have inherited.

What did you hope to achieve in Council?

When I was first elected, it was a whole new learning game; it was a very quick learning curve and I had probably sat back for 3 months or so before I decided to make my first address in Council. This gave me the opportunity to work out my areas of interest and decide where I wanted to contribute. I have always had a love of local history and heritage, so I wanted to contribute in this field. I was able to do this through the Heritage Advisory Committee later on, initiating the School Kit for infant, primary and secondary school students in the Municipality.

There was a great shortage of child care and, in late 1992, a local resident, Vivi Catalano, approached me and said, "Why don't we discuss all the issues related to

childcare?" So, we prepared a Report which we presented to Council in October 1993.

I guess that period (the mid-1990s) heralded the opening of more child care centres in the Municipality.
Also, on the note of Access...
Having elderly parents, I realised the difficulties associated with this area and I

served on Council's Access Committee and also on the SSROC Access. These areas: heritage & local history, childcare and access – are the three that stand out in my mind as achievements.

What Committees did you serve on?

I served on a diversity of Committees and chaired quite a number of those Committees. I also represented Council on SSROC, the Georges River Combined Councils Committee and, in 1997, I initiated the inaugural Heritage Forum for SSROC, which started at Rockdale Council. I also served on Sydney Coastal Councils, which comprised of all Sydney Coastal Councils that had a coast. Not only did I serve

on internal Council committees but also, I was a delegate to external Council committees... so, it was an extensive workload.

Who were your mentors?

There weren't many women involved politics in my time. I was only the fourth woman to have been elected to Rockdale Council; it was a male-dominated environment. Of course there have been more women since. Being in Rotary was a good experience and having served with very few other women on a hospital board was an additional experience for working in a male-dominated environment.

I guess my mentors were reliable community members – [for example] a lady, who was actually an Alderman on another Council. I am actually still in touch with her today.

People of that ilk, of that sort of standing, I conferred with as my mentors because they'd been there; they had been in a male-dominated environment and they understood. In terms of community members, well perhaps I was able to pick their brains for ideas, suggestions and advice — consultative advice.

What was it like being a female in Council?

Very difficult. It wasn't an easy experience but, as I said, I had very good training serving in male-dominated areas. One of my male colleagues, who wanted to annoy me, would turn the microphone on deliberately and rustle paper so I that could not be heard. He sometimes made sexist remarks during Council debate, but then again, with my sarcastic wit, I was able to counter some of those comments.

So, in other words, I learnt to build up my own defence mechanisms and developed a very thick skin to survive in the male-dominated environment. Yes, I did survive and although it was a challenge at times, it was a huge learning experience.

Were there any contentious issues during your time on Council?

Yes, we had quite a number of contentious Building Applications (which are now, of course, called Development Applications). There were issues to do with Arncliffe Park, Moate Avenue car park development in Brighton-Le-Sands, the Brighton LEP, and redevelopment of the car park site in Rockdale- the Council car park site. There was also the Bardwell Park Golf Course and issues dealing with the rezoning of Bexley Primary School. The Coptic Church ultimately developed a church and redeveloped a school on this site. Another issue that comes to mind was the

proposed development of a ski jump in West Botany Street, Rockdale. These were some of the contentious issues over my 8 years serving on Rockdale Council.

What did you enjoy most and least?

I enjoyed the ability to meet many people, to mix widely across the community and to be able to attend the many activities that the Council organised — dinners, openings, street meetings... The Council always had a number of functions, and at the end of the year there was a Council Christmas party and Mayoral Ball. They were all very pleasant functions to attend.

Also, in my timeline you will see that I visited a number of overseas Councils. I visited Councils in the United States and the United Kingdom and those links were set up through the General Manager at Rockdale. So, that was a very worthy plus and enabled me to gain excellent international experience.

A negative, I guess, would have been the long working hours. The meetings were very long and sometimes I would be driving home at one o'clock in the morning. There was quite a lot of paperwork that needed to be read, and I certainly made sure that I read all my paperwork. There were phone calls from the residents; I was always reasonably prompt and I always returned phone calls.

There were probably a few other issues, when some people didn't like some of the decisions that you'd made. Maybe there were a few objectionable phone calls, and this was a negative.

But I'd like to think that the positives outweighed the negatives and I think the residents at the end of the day would always say that I stood up to represent them with a great deal of fairness and integrity.

What did you do after you left the Rockdale City Council?

After I left Rockdale, I moved to Kogarah Council and I was elected to Kogarah Council, representing North Ward. I represented the Kogarah Bay Progress Association from 1999-2008. I retired from Council in September 2008. So I crossed the Princes Highway, so to speak, to move to another Council.

Would you encourage other females to enter politics?

Yes, I think it's very important that we have female representatives. At the moment we have a female Prime Minister, a female Governor General, a female Premier, and I think it's very, very important as women represent half the population.

I believe that women on Council do things completely differently to the male Councillors. Women have a much more consultative approach, they're much better at talking to people and trying to resolve things by mediation, whereas the men do things differently. And of course, if there are more men, they tend to 'gang up', so to speak. I know that in some Councils, women have had a particularly hard time.

When I first joined Council, I joined the Australian Local Government Women's Association, New South Wales Division, so that I could attend the Local Government Women's Conference. I didn't attend every year, but it was a mechanism through which women could give support to each other for their role in Council. I became friends with women on other Councils, so we assisted each other and my support base widened.

In hindsight, would you change anything that you did? If so, why?

No, I don't believe so. I know that when I was first elected, my late father (Mr. Ron Field) said to me: "Always remember to treat the residents in the manner that you'd like to be treated" and I always kept that in the back of my mind. I always treated the residents with courtesy and due respect.

To this day, when I'm out shopping, I still see some of them and we stop and have a chat. I've become friends with some of them and I think that that probably speaks for their perceptions of how I undertook my role on Council – I did it to represent them; I wasn't there to represent any interest group, I was there to represent the community. So, in hindsight no, but again the political arena is completely different today. It's a completely different ball game, and there are many different issues that confront Councils today than in my time. There is a greater need for accountability and transparency... But no, I don't think I'd change anything.

Significant events that occurred during your time on Council.

Well, I guess some significant events related to Rockdale becoming a City in 1995 and there were links with other cities overseas (we had Sister City relationships). Towards the end of my time at Rockdale there was a proposal for what later became the Cook's Cove Development. This has not gone ahead. The development of a Coles supermarket on the Moate Avenue car park site brought benefits to the residents of Brighton-Le-Sands.

In the future do you think you will return to a life of politics? Why or why not?

Well, perhaps if I was younger, I might continue. However, I think that New South Wales politics at the moment is in a very difficult state.

So I think that in New South Wales and Federal politics as well as Local Government, there needs to be a great deal of concern addressed to candidates – the quality of candidates, how candidates are chosen, and the abilities of candidates.

I'm sometimes quite disappointed in what I currently hear and read about in the local newspaper. Time does not permit me to want to return, as my next career is in writing - I want to finish my Moorefield Racecourse history, publish it and then I want to go on and write other things. So, I remain an interested observer from the sidelines of contemporary politics.

Saved from the sin bin by eagle-eyed women

ROCKDALE Council's aldermen and seven senior officers swung widely on the pendulum in their responses to The Leader's 10-question survey on minimisation and recycling.

While they inched ahead of Hurst-ville Council in that all respondents separated PET plastic, glass, alu-minium cans and paper, more lost points for tossing putrescent waste such as food scraps and garden clip-pings in rubbish bins.

Underlying most responses was a heavy reliance on women to save them toppling in the sin bin.

The mayor, Alderman Peter Bryant's bin is free of the four common recyclables, but it has food scraps and garden clippings because the Bryants have no compost facilities.

He sorts paper beyond just news-print and council papers, to corre-spondence, toothpaste and cereal boxes and other clean waste paper.

No respondent claimed to be plastic bag free and only two said they some-times refused them, while corporate services director Alan Young's three children wrap their lunches in paper bags.

Plastic bags

"You can't get away from plastic bags," Alderman George Moore said

"I don't refuse them because that's making a mountain out of a molehill."

Two-litre plastic milk containers also end up in the Moore bin because, he says, it is too far to take them to the Lucas Heights recycling centre.

"And I wouldn't store them be-cause we'd get rats. Nothing's clear is he said

it?" he said.

Alderman Ron Rathbone, 60, who has served for 33 years, is unconcerned about tossing out toothpaste boxes, because he has few of them.

"I don't have many teeth," he said.
"And living in a home unit, waste is a problem, so I automatically look for things that don't generate waste because I don't want to be running up and down the stairs."

Southern Sydney's only husband and wife team, aldermen Charles and Elizabeth Daly, both in their 80s, were also the only respondents to pack purchases in personal shopping trollies.

They were alone in using Colgate Palmolive dishwashing detergent because it now comes in recyclable PET

plastic, and they crush laundry detergent boxes for kerbside collection.

Their score increased to a high seven when Ald Elizabeth Daly re-vealed her husband sorted through the kitchen tidy to check for more recycla-ble materials, including food scraps destined for composting.

Aluminium cans

"I don't think we could do much more without putting ourselves in the

bin," she said.
Council's only other female alderman, teacher Anne Field, can be spotted alongside her bin reading an Australian Conservation Foundation bulletin from cover to cover, while in-

side the bin are food scraps, garden waste, empty hair spray cans, and cardboard food packaging.

"I really haven't had the time to cultivate environmental habits,"

From the sale of aluminium cans. community and environment commit-tee chairman Alderman Denis Calla-ghan donates about \$250 annually to a Jesuit mission in India.

He failed to score on questions about detergents, including their phosphorous content and packaging disposal.

"I've got a terrific system. I drop my clothes in a hole and the next thing I find them all ironed and folded in

drawers. I don't understand it but it's a dammed good system," Ald Callaghan said.

Daphne Callaghan also does the shopping while her husband waits outside to carry groceries to the car.

"I must tell my buyer not to get packaged stuff. I'll refuse to carry things if they're in plastic. She'll have to carry them herself," he said. Fellow committee member Alder-

man Steve Holroyd's 240-litre bin for four people contains plastic and poly-styrene packaging and other general household items.

Ald Holroyd opposes the Lucas High rolroyd opposes the Lucas Heights tip expansion and says the Waste Recycling and Processing Centre — formerly part of the now defunct Waste Management Authority — should shift emphasis from kerburds callegians. side collections.

"They are relying on each person to separate waste. There's only so much interest in recycling. People have other things on their minds and they put things in the bin and that's it. Some people will never sort through their own garbage," he said.

"Ultimately in years to come, we'll have to take rubbish and liquid waste right out west over the Great Dividing Range." Alderman Brian Peacock gives old

newspapers to a local veterinarian to line animal cages, and flattens and ties cardboard and other paper in leftover curtain selvages for recycling.

Reduce waste with a holistic approach

SUTHERLAND Shire can be Sydney's No. I council for reducing waste and recycling if it is serious about taking a "holistic approach" to the problem (*Leader*, March 17).

That means getting the priorities right and being prepared to reduce waste before it is created – not just recycling it afterwards.

The first step in minimising waste means avoiding it wherever possible by selecting no-waste alternatives when shopping. Where this is not possible or is impractical, purchases should be of a material that is com-

pletely recyclable into the same product.

Anything less will create waste which will inevitably end up at the tip.

Consider the following examples of living simply, without waste:

Drinks – water, straight from the tap; freshly squeezed juice from fruit with compostable skins; milk purchased in returnable/refillable glass bottles from the milko; soft drinks purchased in returnable/refillable glass bottles such as those

sold in the Shire by Berts and Crystal.

Food – fresh fruit, with compostable skins; bulk foods purchased in your own reusable bags and containers; homemade food such as muesli, bread, cakes, biscuits made from bulk purchased ingredients.

Our council can do a lot to reduce waste at the source if it is prepared to promote and encourage wastefree alternatives to overpackaged products.



Design and aesthetics not highly valued

SIR: Yet another holier than thou letter from N. Gruzman (Letters, March 17).

If a lot of architects design the sort of buildings that N. Gruzman describes, it is because they share their clients' individualistic, devil-take-the-hindmost, anti-community values, values that are more common than not in our society.

The really important basic parameters that affect the design of buildings, such as the permitted height, site coverage and gross floor space, are fixed not by architects but by local government planners and are driven by real estate and financial considerations.

Does anyone really believe that letting local councils set aesthetic standards will make any difference? Councils already have the powers to reject buildings on the grounds of design and rarely exercise them, either because it is politically too hard, or they do not mind what is being proposed. In any case, any new regulations will be

like the tax laws, there to be got around by the unscrupulous, and simply end up mirroring the lowest common denominator of the community's values. Certainly not those of some philosopher king like N. Gruzman who knows best!

N. Gruzman appears to see himself as the conscience of the architectural profession and regularly castigates architects as though they are solely responsible for the state of our cities. Although one obviously cannot disagree with a number of his motherhood strictures, they simply don't serve to foster an intelligent debate on what are really serious problems.

There are architects genuinely trying to resolve the legitimate needs of their clients, along with the multifarious requirements of planners, building regulations and the building budget they have been given, and still produce sympathetic and caring buildings...

Architects are being forced to oper-

ate in a very competitive professional environment where, on the whole, the lowest tender for fees is accepted, regardless of the consequences. The unbridled competition of the economic rationalists may improve productivity and efficiency, and it certainly lowers fees, but it does not normally improve quality. We unfortunately live in an age that places a low value on design and aesthetics and this is reflected in the low incomes of most architects.

N. Gruzman is living in another world. The letter from Paul Stevenson in the same issue is much more to the point.

I, like Mr N. Gruzman (Letters, March 17), have met many variations in design in the past 18 months as an alderman on Rockdale Council.

Many of the designs which attempt to squeeze the building onto small sites end

up pleasing no-one. The aesthetics of the design-are lost and the applicant and the objector end up enemies. The impact on the street's character is marked.

What our architects do forget is that what they design for their clients impact on everyone else in the environment. The built environment is the end result of everyone's actions. One must admit that in many areas of Sydney there is a need for improvement.

Architects alone cannot be blamed for the mess. Councils must take their fair share of the blame as well.

Some of my colleagues, who believe that if it fits the Code all is well, have blinkers on. What about the other considerations such as privacy, overshadowing, bulk and character, just to name a few.

How many urban disasters do we need before the blinkers are removed?

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Few of the participants in an experiment at Rockdale Council realised how tough it was to post a letter or buy a beer at the pub when you are confined to a wheel-

On Tuesday, six able-bodied people, including the Mayor, Alderman Ron Rathbone, and Alderman Anne Field, had to carry out a series of "missions" in Rockdale, while either in wheelchairs or pushing a

None of the participants in wheelchairs completed all their set tasks, as they came up against steps, gutters and other obstacles.

Buying meat, going to the bank, making a telephone call or getting into public toilets were far from straight forward tasks.

After the 45-minute experiment was over, Ald Rath-

bone said it had been an eye-opener. Of his set tasks, he said: "It was not difficult. It was impossible.

Kevin Byrne, who is genuinely confined to a wheelchair and who sits on council's Access Committee, said many people in wheelchairs had to do their banking on the street because they could not get up stairs and ramps designed by able-bodied architects.

In such cases, the bank manager had to come out onto the footpath for people in wheelchairs to carry out their transactions, Mr Byrne said.

Mr Byrne said he would like to see architects and

HORSE RACING - AN OVERVIEW

(part of an address by Ald. Anne Field to the Rotary Club of Rockdale)

You either love or hate the races. On the racecourse you expect to see people betting, shouting, eating, drinking, counting their money or bemoaning their losses. People come from every walk of life. In the Members' Stand you may rub shoulders with Kerry Packer, Lionel Bowen ex-politician or Peter Foley (a well-known Rotarian) or Mrs Jones.

Over the past century or so, Australia has made great progress in the world of horse racing. The status of the industry is high and it continues to attract investment in the thoroughbred horse. A visit to the Arrowfield Stud in the Hunter Valley, which I made in 1990, confirmed this fact and the high levels of technology evident in today's industry. Our trainers travel overseas to sales, likewise overseas buyers attend our yearling sales.

In 1799 the first English thoroughbred stallion, Rockingham, arrived in Australia - a cargo of well-bred mares had landed in Sydney from the Cape of Good Hope four years earlier. After 1820, the majority of imported horses were from England.

Boost for child carers

Dozers combat beach erosion

SAND-DUNE stabilisation work has begun at Lady Robinson's Beach as part of a plan to combat erosion along the Botany Bay foreshore.

The Department of Conservation and Land Mangement (CALM) began bulldozing to relocate and shape the sand dunes at Kyeemagh on

July 5.
Following this, coastal plants, protective fences and beach access ways will

be put in place. Councillor Anne Field said Rockdale Council was given a grant of \$25,000 by the Public Works Department and council contributed \$25,000 out of 1993 estimates to undertake dune stabilisation at four locations along Robinson's Beach.

Stabilisation work is

proceeding: 1. Adjacent to Kyee-

1. Adjacent to Kyee-magh carpark. 2. North of carpark op-posite Banks Street. 3. Opposite carpark be-tween Banks Street and Solander Street.

4. Opposite Burlington Street.

Cr Field said Rockdale Council had had control and management of a stretch of the shoreline of Botany Bay for the past 25 years but had not had control of the developments undertaken by Federal and State Governments.

"It is these activities which have resulted in significant damage and ero-sion to foreshore land," she said.

She said dredging, extensions to the airport in 1965, the third runway and the construction of the Port Botany facility had caused changes in wave patterns which have led to

the erosion.
"Botany Bay has the potential to develop as a major tourist area, there-fore it is imperative our serious problem of erosion be addressed as part of a new coastal management policy," Cr Field said. CALM has nominated

Ald Field said any snippets of in-formation she gathered, including anecdotes from the track's heyday, would soon be included in a book by local historian Doctor Joan Hatton.

'The book will be available for residents to buy, and school students can use it as a resource for local history," she said.

Report into Rockdale area childcare released

ROCKDALE Councillor Anne Field and St George childcare co-ordinator Vivi Catalano have released a comprehensive report on the provision of childcare in the Rockdale municipality.

Compiled over a 12 month period, the voluntary report identifies areas concern regarding childcare needs without a survey.

"A survey was not completed due to limited time and resources," Cr Field

said. "The review of child care was held by us, so it may be a community matter given a high priority when it is tabled finally at Rockdale Council.'

Cr Field, a local high school teacher, said she has an interest in the development and welfare of the children she taught and those who were entering the education process for the first time.

Vivi Catalano provided the catalyst for the report last year when she wrote a disturbing letter to Cr

Field, her local third ward councillor.

"I wanted to see Rockdale Council take a more active role in the provision of child care in its municipality," she said.

"There is a need."

The two met a week later as a result of the letter and the voluntary project was born.

A multi-lingual questionnaire was prepared and distributed throughout the municipality to gather the necessary information from concerned local parents.

Catalano Mrs worked extensively in children's services.

She became aware of a chronic shortage of childcare facilities in the St George region when she was employed as a Contact Children's switch board operator.

After completing her diploma in early childhood education, at Macquarie University, she was appointed childcare director at AMEP, Rockdale.

"She is co-ordinating

the Sups program in St George," Cr Field said.

In 1970, 10 per cent of women with children under the age of five were the report working, showed.

"Now 45 per cent are working," Cr Field said.

"Accordingly the number of child care centres has grown.

"In NSW there were 32 long day care centres in NSW in 1977.

"By 1988 there were 350."

The report has recommended that children, 0-3 years, in the municipality receive the council's highest priority.

This example is living proof that pedestrians and others can safely cohabit the same carriageways.

Let's face it, if more cyclists took to the streets, not only would we be reducing the amount of pollutants in our atmosphere, but also we would be a much fitter and healthier na-

Labor councillor Steve Holroyd will remain top spot in fourth ward and Independent councillors Mayor Peter Bryant, Brian Peacock, Ron Rathbone and George Moore also plan to run for re-election at this stage.

Cr Bryant, who has been on council for 27 years, said council usually only saw three changes after an election.

'It is difficult to say what effect the changes will have on council until we know exactly who the candidates are and what they stand for," he said.

"It is important to get candidates who can represent the community, but still operate within the economic practicalities of running a coun-



Grandstand starts major racial row

A PLAN to revamp a grandstand has sparked a racial row marking the changing face of Rockdale City.

More than 70 residents and members of the Arncliffe Aurora Youth Soccer Club crammed into Rockdale Council chambers last Wednesday to see if the council would approve a plan to upgrade the grandstand and facilities at Arncliffe Park.

After a long, heated debate, councillors voted 8-7 to spend no more than \$150,000 refurbishing amenities in the grandstand, removing the seats, bricking up a void and building a kiosk.

The council would also incorporate the new design into its amended management plan and place it back on public exhibition, the motion said.

However Councillors Peter Bryant, Liz Barlowe and Anne Field later lodged a rescission motion which will be debated on July 24.

During the meeting the gallery applauded, cheered or jeered, as arguments for and against were presented.

An unsigned pamphlet distributed before the meeting fired up the debate with its claims the revamped grandstand and a "social room" would be primarily for the use of the soccer club. "Arncliffe Park is for all resi-

"Arncliffe Park is for all residents, not just one sporting group or any particular ethnic group or groups," the pamphlet said.

Residents opposed to the proposal claimed the plan would exacerbate a "hoodlum" problem and cited heritage concerns.

Those supporting the plans said it would provided vital sporting facilities for youth and preserve a valuable council asset.

Speaking at the meeting's public forum, Howard Packer said the main problem with the development was the location and the way decisions had been made.

He asked why Arncliffe Park was chosen and why its stakeholders had not been informed.

"Arncliffe Park is a very special place in the area," Mr Packer said.

"It is one of the few passive recreation facilities in Ward Two."

Adnan Mourad tabled a petition with about 1000 signatures supporting the upgrade of the grandstand.

"We are proud of Arncliffe Park and the (war) memorial," Mr Mourad said.

"We (Aurora Soccer Club) do

not require sole use of the grandstand or kiosk. We never have and we never would promote Arncliffe Park as a sole use for Aurora or any one group."

Councillor Shaoquett Moselmane described the pamphlet as "gutless and full of misinformation".

Cr Ray Oxford said the pamphlet was "spot on" and accused Cr Moselmane, who is Lebanese, of "leaning towards people of his own background".

The Mayor of Rockdale, Councillor Bill Saravinovski, asked Cr Oxford to withdraw the comment or leave the chamber.

Cr Oxford withdrew his remarks and later apologised to Cr Moselmane.

Cr Lang said the issue had stirred up dishonesty and "ethnic bashing" but Cr Saravinvoski cautioned all councillors not to raise racial issues during the debate.

Cr Moselmane later said residents were welcome to telephone him on 556 2420 and discuss their concerns.

He said the telephone number printed on the pamphlet was incorrect.


Council wins top award

Council takes the plunge to demolish heritage-listed pool

Just weeks after the NSW National Trust classified 70 of Sydney's ocean and harbour pools, Rockdale Council has voted to demolish one of the oldest of them.

Ramsgate Baths are the last of the timber pools in the Botany Bay/Georges River area and were originally built in the early years of the century.

In 1973 they were enlarged, using much of the original piles.

Ms Kathy Erdelyi, secretary of the trust's southern Sydney branch, said yesterday that despite a report to the council recommending that a heritage consultant be employed to advise on the refurbishment of the baths, the council had voted eightto-five for their demolition.

The baths had been closed for some time because of deterioration, but it would have been possible to follow "standard procedure" and scrape the piles back and mesh the pool with stainless steel wire and nylon, as suggested in a report to

the council. The baths, which were classified by the National Trust in 1994, were once the home of the Ramsgate Amateur Swimming

Club and to swimmers such as the 1936 Australian champion, Garth Cooper, the 1943-53 Australian and world champion Gary Chapman and to John Holt, who was the World Ironman champion in 1971.

Ms Elsa Atkin, the executive director of the National Trust, said flies trust was "horrified" by the council's disregard of the pool's heritage significance.

Councillor Anne Field, Rock-dale's Deputy Mayor and chair-woman of the council's heritage advisory committee, said the five councillors who were opposed to demolition felt "utterly frustrated" by the attitude of the majority.

"It is especially odd to make such a decision just weeks after the trust classified other pools and just weeks before Heritage Week," she said.

"But it has become clear to me ever since I've been on council that Rockdale doesn't have a positive attitude to its heritage or social history.

To the scrap h council heritage list

By TANYA STAS ROCKDALE Council has voted to scrap its controversial heritage list and start over from scratch.

This is providing that the Minister for Urban Affairs and Planning, Craig Knowles, agrees.

Councillors voted not to proceed with the heritage list, known as Local Environment Plan Number 103, because the number of listed properties more than 700 made it unworkable.

Instead, the council wants to start a new heritage plan in stages as a matter of urgency.

The plan could start with about 30 pre-1900 properties of great heritage significance.

Other stages of the list could include the post-1900 periods.

These would also include properties where the owners had already indicated a desire for their properties to be listed.

The council would like the heritage consultant to conduct an internal examination of properties being considered for the top 30 list.

Rockdale Council has also called for a report on an education campaign to tell resi-

dents about the advantages and disadvantages of heritage listings after councillors expressed their concerns about misinformation in the community.

Cr Ron Rathbone said the council had made a "mess of this whole approach to heritage... in stark contrast to most other councils" on the issue.

"Rockdale, over a period of four years, has not tried to educate the people of our area,"

he said.
"It hasn't done it with its own councillors."

Cr Rathbone said much could be gained if the council and councillors went out and spoke to residents and gave them the truth about heritage.

Cr Shaoquett Moselmane said he wanted the Local Environment Plan (LEP) deferred for two months and that the listing "basically demned the residents".

Cr Anne Field said the council should not delay in making a decision on the issue.

"We don't want to make ourselves even more a laughing stock in Sydney's heritage cir-cles than we already are," she

Cr Bryant said the whole issue had been badly handled from the start.

There were too many proper-ties on the list to handle rationally and there was "great value in starting again," he said.

"People who own these properties have had a sword over their heads for the past four years," Cr Bryant said.

"If we were to discard that LEP and start the whole process over again, we could then look at certain properties a group at a time along the lines of Cr Rathbone's suggestions."

Cr Geoff Hedge then moved that the council not proceed with the LEP.

Cr Liz Barlow said this could only prolong the process because the minister could again reject it.

Sydney branch of the National Trust of Australia, said incentives, says a National Trust both State and Federal Governments offered grants spokewoman. offered a range of discounts, assistance and advice.

Some local councils offered rate relief, free processing of development and building applications, reduced parking requirements and development standards, discounted services and items, financial assistance and free heritage advice.

As well as maintaining the character of the street, Ms Polydorou said heritage-listed properties helped maintain high property values.

Ms Polydorou agreed there were some disad-

vantages to owning heritage-listed properties.
"You have to do your alterations and additions carefully within guidelines," she said.

There is more council red tape if the owner wants to do something.

Rockdale Council offers a number of incentives for owners of heritage-listed properties.

The council's heritage architect can provide free advice, while, in certain circumstances, the council will waive fees for carparking, open space, drainage and community facilities. Development Application fees could also be waived.

Heritage homeowners can apply for a local area grant of up to \$1,000 to carry out work which would help conserve the building.

Rockdale Council can only dispense a total of \$10,000 in local area grants each year, but a council officer said the council had not yet exceeded that

The council may also consider a range of uses for a heritage property which might otherwise not be allowed by the zoning.

If the home owner planned to extend the heritage structure, the council would exclude the floor space item from the floor space ratio.

Rockdale Council's manager of urban planning

services, Alex Sarno, said heritage-listed properties in poor condition could be demolished with permission of the council and the Heritage Council.

Extensions could also be made, with council approval, as long as the character of the house was not compromised.

Mr Sarno said the council did not require the property owners to carry out anything more than normal maintenance.

There may be additional costs in carrying out the work in a sympathetic manner. However, this can also add to the value of the property." he said.


Owners of heritage-listed properties were not required to restore them.

Under the council's heritage guidelines, the heritage item can be painted the colour of the owner's choice and building maintenance and interior changes can be carried out without council approval.

As well, rooms in a roof, basement or first floor addition could be acceptable and car parking structures could be built.

Mr Sarno said there was no evidence to suggest that heritage listing affected property values.

Cr Saravinovski said he was conamenity. cerned about the impact of the proposed development's entry and exits on the already congested West Botany Street, the operating hours and the effect of the six-storey-high development on the values of adjoining residential proper-

"We have to show a commitment to our residents and oppose this develop-

ment," he said.
"I have no problems with the concept, but the proposal is in the wrong location."

Speaking for the residents, Graham Watson urged councillors not to be misled by Polar Technologies' social and economic study which, he said, did not consider the views of objectors.

Trevor Davis from Polar Technologies stressed the benefits the recreation centre would bring to Rockdale.

THE long-running row over proposed amenities at Arncliffe Park reached a new low last week when Liberal and independent councillors boycotted a Rockdale Council extraordinary meeting.

Their not appearing meant the meeting could not proceed because the minimum number of councillors for a meeting was not present.

The Liberals and independents boycotted the meeting because they were concerned a vote on additional canteen facilities for Arncliffe Park - the issue over which the extraordinary meeting was called - would not go their

Councillors who did not attend the meeting included independents Yvonne Bellamy, Anne Field, Brian Peacock, Liz Barlow, Ron Rathbone, Peter Bryant and

Liberal Geoff Hedge. The Liber- sporting clubs in Rockdale were als and independents who opposed the canteen were one short of a majority because of Cr Ray, Oxford's leave of absence, leaving the likely numbers tied at 7-all with a casting vote to come from Mayor Brian Simpson (ALP).

Cr Kent Johns (ALP), who co-sponsored the canteen motion, described the boycott as petty and accused the absentees of ignoring their council responsibilities.

"It doesn't say much about their commitment to duty, does it! They [the Liberals and independents] could have rescinded any vote they weren't happy with at the next [monthly council] meeting, so the whole thing doesn't make sense.'

Cr Bellamy said she was concerned an unfair precedent could be set because other raising funds to build their own facilities, while the council was considering building a kiosk for Arncliffe Park which only had a couple of users.

"We have got an issue there that has been ongoing at Arncliffe Park and we have got a councillor away," she said. "That councillor will be back."

Cr Bryant refused to comment. Last week's boycott was the latest instalment in a long-running saga over facilities at Arncliffe Park.

It came a week after the council's May 13 decision to accept a tender of \$172,300 from Seven Ways Constructions to build the proposed amenities building, after the previous tender was unable to complete the work because of serious illness.

High-rise opponents protest at the Quay

ST GEORGE and Sutherland Shire residents added their voices to a Sydney-wide protest against "ad hoc" higher density rezoning and overdevelopment at a rally last Sunday at Circular Quay.

The rally was organised by the newly formed community group, Save Our Sydney Suburbs, and drew participants from all over Sydney including residents from Hurstville, Kogarah, Rockdale and Sutherland Shire.

A leaflet advertising the rally urged residents to say "no" to increased traffic, loss of privacy, increased urban violence, degraded environment and diminished lifestyle due to overdevelopment.

Rockdale councillor Anne Field spoke briefly at the meeting about how the State Govern-

ment's policy of urban consolidation had failed. Cr Field said "never had the urban environment been in such urgent need of vigorous debate" and this was reflected in the "arrogant pursuit" of high-rise developments in areas such as Rockdale, Hurstville and Kogarah.

"Residents are tired of traffic problems associated with higher densities," Cr Field said.

"They have not invested huge sums of money on their homes, their assets, to suffer a loss of value and the subsequent loss of amenity to their residential areas.

"They simply do not want to move, driven out by the developer who is ever greedy for profits."

Oyster Bay resident and member of community group Shire Watch Gordon Hocking, said the representatives at the rally far outweighed the number of people

gathered there. He said there was "tremendous interest" in issues such as ecologically sustainable development and many residents felt they had not been consulted.

"People are no longer prepared to have the decision-making process taken away from them." Mr Hocking said.

"Decisions are being made that affect them directly and they want total participation and involvement in that decision-making process."

Speakers at the rally called on the State Government to repeal planning laws encouraging urban consolidation and said local infrastructure could not support increased housing.

The rally called for a Sydneywide study on environment heritage, infrastructure, traffic and transport issues before further development was approved. The leader

A history lesson to be remembered

STUDENTS from Arncliffe Infants School experienced a dose of history served up with good, old-fashioned hospitality when they visited historic Lydham Hall at Rockdale last week.

The children even dressed the part, with boys donning long pants and caps and girls in long dresses, hats and hair ribbons, for the excursion called Everyday Life in a Wealthy Home of the 19th Century.

The event was a trial run of a new program for infants and primary school children organised by the Lydham Hall management committee.

The public has long been able to tour the house, which was built in the 1860s and features a treasure trove of antique

furniture and crockery. But the children's visit was designed to give them a "hands on" understanding of what life was like in that era.

They were asked to remove their shoes at the back door, as usually only smooth soled, clean footwear was worn in a 19th century home.

They also filled out worksheets comparing the older furnishings in a room, such as the bathroom, with the same room in their own homes.

Anne Field, a Rockdale Councillor. who is also head of the Lydham Hall management committee said the committee wanted the children to have an exciting day and experience something different.

Champion of history

HE was a champion of Sydney's heritage wars in the 1960s and '70s so it was only fitting that former trade union leader, Jack Mundey, should launch the new book and brochure on historic Lydham Hall, Rockdale.

Mr Mundey, now chairman of the Historic Houses Trust, was behind the world famous green bans which saved The Rocks in Sydney, and parts of Woolloomooloo, Glebe and Centennial Park from demolition.

The event at Lydham Hall was on a much smaller scale but almost as important to the members of the Lydham Hall Management Committee and community who gathered for the launch during NSW Heritage Week.

Mundey at launch

The projects represent years of work by the committee and volunteers who have worked to make Lydham Hall more accessible to the public since Rockdale Council purchased the property in 1970.

The book will not be available until later in the year but the brochure sets out the history of the house and its inhabitants.

Visitors were also taken on historic walks around Arncliffe and Rockdale and previewed the

inaugural exhibition of 40 unusual items from Lydham Hall such as a 100-year-old Lily Tiffany Lamp and a mahogany half tester bed.

Lydham Hall, built around 1860, is one of the few buildings remaining from the time when Rockdale was a sparsely populated rural area.

The land on which it stands was originally part of 1200 acres granted to James Chandler in 1822 and named Bexley after his birthplace in England.

In 1859 wealthy butcher, Joseph Davis, bought 67 acres there and commissioned Swedish stone mason, Sven Bengtson, to construct a house with sweeping views of Botany Bay.
